Outreach Asia is an entirely volunteer organization whose administration costs represent less than 4% of our total yearly budget.

As a result, 96% of all grants and donations go directly toward helping those who need it most – the poor and least advantaged of some of the world's most under-developed countries.

GEMS PROGRAM

GEMS project offers hope for the future

GEMS Heart Outreach Development – a project we support in the Philippines – realized its goal in 2007 to reach out to 400 children and families in the impoverished Nazareth neighborhood of Cavite through a new Children's Activity Center.

Built in 2007 with support from the community and Outreach Asia sponsors, the center supports the area's children and families with sessions on leadership, family life, health and nutrition, early childhood care and values/culture education.

The center has become a second home for the neighbourhood's children, youth, mothers and fathers, and it has continued to grow.

Support from the Catholic Education Association of the Philippines helped set up a community library at the center to teach reading, writing and arithmetic. The association donated an encyclopedia set and children's books on science, math, Filipino and English reading. Outreach Asia contributed four new computers, now being used for a mother's program, office use, and training children and youth in basic

computer literacy. The children use the units for letters, drawing, educational games and listening to stories on CD.

The center is a safe haven for children when they're not at school or home. Small children read books, play with toys, draw and color.

Before heading to school, students can have a bowl of soup or a light snack. After school, they relax or do homework using the reference materials. The children love the warm ambience and staff's caring attitudes.

To support GEMS' new feeding program for malnourished children, Outreach Asia ships food each quarter from Feed The Starving Foundation in Minnesota. When parents lose their jobs and can't afford food, their children grow sick and weak and stop attending school. GEMS staff target these children with a three-month feeding program, including weight monitoring.

In October, Outreach Asia volunteer Andy Sandilands funded an all-day field trip. Children and parent volunteers visited the Manila Zoo and Children's Museum, and enjoyed snacks at MacDonald's and lunch at Jolibee's. It was the first time these 32 children had ventured out from their poor home environments to see something interesting and educational.

At Christmas, sponsors of GEMS' children donated \$30 to provide two kilos of pork, a 55-pound sack of rice, a whole lechon chicken, large bottles of





cooking oil and soy sauce, and bags of sugar, coffee, coconut and candy.

It was a huge surprise to the families when they received the gifts at GEMS' Christmas party. One mother announced: "Halleluiah!"

EAST TIMOR

Dormitory project helps poor students

New dormitories in East Timor, Indonesia will provide free room and board to about 100 high school students from poor farming villages in the mountains, so they can continue studying to become teachers in their communities. The main building was completed in January 2008, and 10 small houses will be constructed by May 2008.

Outreach Asia shipped a new tractor and other farm implements in September, 2007 to Suailoro village, where farmers were fighting a losing battle against aggressive thatch with hand tools.

Our contact in Suailoro, Father Peter Phuc, report-

ed that 100 families have already been helped and 105 more are on the waiting list. Donations are helping the poorest families with the fuel costs.



SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Outreach Asia is proud to have established a college sponsorship program in 2003 for students attending Southern Leyte State University in the Philippines. After a government subsidy, we help cover the remaining tuition of \$210 per year per student.

We only accept high school graduates with marks of 85% or better who have no other family assistance to help them. All prospective students are screened by Outreach Asia staff Tayo Capalaran, a retired principal.



In March, 18 of our scholars graduated. All successfully took the teachers's board exam and will become teachers in their communities.

We have a waiting list of bright young individuals who need support on their quest for higher education and a better life.

WATER FOR LIFE

Outreach Asia began our Water for Life program in 2003. Since then, we have worked with schools and communities in Vietnam and the Philippines to install 15 water systems that provide muchneeded drinking water. In 2008, we plan to help provide water systems at Tomas Oppus High School, Maslog Primary School and Pasil Community, all in Southern Leyte, the Philippines.

Teacher Imelda Luna at Central School in Leyte – one of our water system recipients – writes: "The need to provide a safe and potable water supply to the school children is a big problem. But suddenly somebody brought good news to the school

that Outreach Asia of Edina, Minnesota will give a water system to our school. A feeling of surprise to everyone! Who could be the charitable persons kind enough to think of donating a water system. Eureka, we know who you are! Long live Outreach Asia."



SAFE HAVEN ORPHANAGE



Fifteen years ago, Tasanee Keereepraneed received a frantic message from a villager in Tha Song Yang, Thailand that a little girl had lost her mother during birth. In the Karen culture this is a bad omen, and the child is often killed. Having lost her own father at a young age, Tasanee decided to help the infant girl.

One by one, children with nowhere to go were given to Tasanee to raise. With her own funds and donations, Safe Haven Orphanage was born. Now home to about 30 children, it's like a large family whose members love and respect each other like brothers and sisters.

Donations have helped Safe Haven purchase five acres of land and begin construction of a new orphanage to accommodate 150 children.

The pressing need now is transportation. The orphanage wants to buy a used fourdoor pick-up truck to transport sick children to Mae Sot, three hours away. Tanasee currently transports the children on a motorcycle, and has already had one bad accident.

Outreach Asia volunteers Don and Somporn Watson and Andy Sandilands recently visited the orphanage, and we are now accepting donations for this important project.

Latest projects and needs

- Child sponsorships for GEMS children in Cavite, Philippines (\$180/yr).
